"When we put bits in the mouths of horses ... we can <u>turn</u> the whole animal." (vs. 3)

"Or take ships as an example. Although they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are <u>steered</u> by a very small rudder <u>wherever the pilot wants to go</u>." (vs. 4)

"Consider what a great forest is <u>set on fire</u> by a small spark. The tongue is also a fire ..." (vs. 5)

"... it sets the <u>whole course</u> of his life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell." (vs. 6b)

"All kinds of animals ... have been tamed by man, but no man can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison." (vs. 7-8)
